What's Wrong...

Is this 3rd grade poetry or 4th grade poetry? The phrases are wooden, trite, derivative.

It is also a "we-we-we" hymn. Almost every line focuses on us - our fears, our dreamings; "we have been sung," "we have been called to be light." We, we, we - we are so engrossed in ourselves.

And the burden is on us, too. It's up to us to make the Christian life happen. "We" are even supposed to be "light to the whole human race."

What's Missing? Christ crucified, the Trinity, sin. Like many contemporary hymns, this one could be sung at a Unitarian–Universalist Assembly. There is nothing much Christian about it.

To be sure, there are a few (fractured) Biblical images in verses 3 and 4 - "the wine and the water" and "the bread of new birth." What a mixed metaphor. But all these images are found in Gnostic, Wiccan, Unitarian, and New Age religion as well.

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
